
News from Friends of The Hook – May 2024

Good News!

We have just heard we have been awarded a grant from the Community Infrastructure Levy to repair and restore the Wildlife Pond. The liner has been leaking, so during dry weather it has dried up completely. Contractors EMEC, linked to the Wildlife Trust, will first collect any wildlife and plants from the pond and store them safely. Then they'll scrape away the mud surface and establish where the leak in the liner is and the reason for it. Then they'll repair, reline and fill the pond. We've also asked for a dipping platform, to make it easier to dip without wearing out the banks of the pond.

Brimstone butterfly out of hibernation

If you spot a flash of sulphurous yellow, it could be a Brimstone butterfly, emerging from its winter hibernation. It will be looking for a mate - the females are a paler, whitish yellow. She will lay her fertilised eggs on the underside of leaves of alder buckthorn and the bright green caterpillars will emerge later in spring. We've tried to make The Hook as inviting as possible, by planting alder buckthorn and sowing wildflower mixes, so we hope they respond to our invitation!



Butterflies are a key indicator species - that means they tell us about the health of the wider environment, so it's important we know about how they are doing. Our team of volunteers will be out every week from April to October walking the same route, called a transect, and counting the numbers and species of butterfly. We'll keep you posted on their findings.

Lady Bay Birdwatchers will be helping to identify the birds by their call and, as it gets lighter, they'll have a telescope/

binoculars to identify them by sight as well.
